In January 2010, the San Mateo County Genealogical Society Library moved to its new location at the Cañada College Library in Redwood City. The SMCGS Library has grown from a “Library in a Box,” which was carried to each society meeting, to a collection of over 6000 books, periodicals, microfilm, microfiche and CDs of genealogical records from all over the United States and many other countries. Our book collection provides the genealogist with strong holdings from New England, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and the old north-west states of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

The SMCGS shelf collection begins with materials on San Mateo County and California. Society volunteers have indexed many San Mateo County records including the Schellens Collection, *Redwood City Tribune/ Peninsula Times Tribune* obituary records and the Layng & Tinney Mortuary Records. These databases can be found online at our website: [www.smcgs.org](http://www.smcgs.org). Among our San Mateo County materials are city directories, Roy Cloud’s “History of San Mateo County” and Svanevik & Burkett’s assorted San Mateo County history articles.

The Library has many special collections including “The American State Papers (9 vols.), the Barbour Collection of Connecticut Vital Records, and the currently published “Silver Books” of the Mayflower Society. Our indexed 900 CD collection has titles covering the United States, Canada, Great Britain, Europe, Middle America and the 1880/81 United States, Canadian and British Census records.

SMCGS volunteers are available to assist patrons on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1 - 4 pm and on the 1st, 2nd, and 4th Wednesday evenings from 4:30 - 7:30pm. Family history researchers may use the SMCGS collection anytime during Cañada College Library open hours, Monday through Thursday 8am - 8pm and Fridays from 8am - 3pm. The College Library has computers with

internet access as well as WiFi for patrons with laptops.

The society is pleased to have its collection housed in a public space where both the college community and the public will be able to discover its genealogical resources. The new location makes Redwood City a “one stop shop” for genealogy research. Not only can researchers use the SMCGS collection but they can quickly drive to downtown Redwood City to access records at the Courthouse, the Redwood City Library History Room and the Historical Association Archives.

Root Cellar – Sacramento Genealogical Society has just released its new publication titled *Divorces, Sacramento County District Court 1850-1879*. The cases are indexed, and each court record found was abstracted. Also included is an addendum to the Index of Defendants and Plaintiffs containing divorce filings that were dismissed. There is wonderful genealogical information in these records, including maiden names, date of migration to California, children's ages, names, and sometimes birth dates, date of marriage, where married, reason for
